page 42–43, Chapter 5	The counterexample presented for pp. 42–43 is invalid.	Change the counterexample on p. 43 to read: For instance, imagine that, during his research, Peter discovers that some people who read all the time are unemployed.
page 128, Chapter 18, Teacher's Edition	The answer is missing for question #2.	Add the following: This a false analogy. The comparison is a poor one for two key reasons. First, deciding to take math or English classes is significantly different from deciding to secede from the Union. Secession is a far more serious issue than class schedules. Secondly, the analogy is examining whether or not the South had a right to secede from the Union, not how difficult it would be to secede. Discussing the difficulty of classes does not in any way pertain to legal rights. Therefore, this analogy is a false analogy because the two things being compared are completely dissimilar.
