page 3, Classical Pronunciation, Short Vowels Chart	Using <i>deus</i> as the example provided for the short vowel <i>e</i> can be confusing for older students because it technically has a diphthong.	Change to: ventus: wind <i>wen-tus</i>
page 4, Pronunciation Key	Indicates macrons will be used, but they are not used in this book.	We will not be using macrons in this book, but the audio CD will guide you so you pronounce vowels correctly.
page 4, Ecclesiastical Pronunciation Key	The letter J sound is incorrect.	Should be: <i>yah-chey-ob</i>
page 4, Ecclesiastical Pronunciation Key	The letter R sound is incorrect.	Should be: <i>ray-jeen-ab</i>
page 4, Ecclesiastical Pronunciation Key	The ecclesiastical pronunciation of <i>ae</i> is not mentioned.	In the ecclesiastical pronunciation, <i>ae</i> is pronounced <i>ay</i>
pages 5, 16, 19, 98, 121, and 141	The word “goodbye” should have a hyphen in it.	In all instances, goodbye should be changed to: good-bye.
page 9, Chapter 2	The number for the third exercise under Practice Your Latin is 2.	The number for the third exercise under Practice Your Latin should be 3.
page 42, Chapter 11, Practice Your Latin, #3b, Answers	Tacite! is misspelled	Should be: Tacete!
page 61, Chapter 16	The Big Dipper is referred to as a constellation, which is incorrect. It’s actually a part of the constellation Ursa Major.	Change the first part of the second paragraph under Grow Your English to the following: Here is another English word that came from Latin: constellation. Constellation means a grouping of stars that make a shape in the sky. Have you ever seen the Big Dipper? That is part of a constellation known as Ursa Major. There are 88 known constellations, and they all have Latin names!
page 68, Teacher’s Edition	There is a typo in the third line.	Should read: or simply enjoy Latin.

page 105, Chapter 27	The first sentence of the first paragraph says that Joseph had twelve brothers, which is incorrect.	Should be: Joseph had eleven brothers.
page 105, Chapter 27	In line 6, the word “stellas” should be bolded, not the word “eleven.”	Bold stellas and remove bold from eleven.

page 4, Ecclesiastical Pronunciation Key	g : always hard like English goat . Example: gaudium : joy; <i>gow-diyum</i>	g is soft before e, i, ae, and oe , like the English germ . Example: magistra : teacher; <i>mab-jee-stra</i> before other letters, g is hard like English goat . Example: gaudium : joy; <i>gow-diyum</i>
page 5, Chapter 1	The <i>J</i> in the Latin Alphabet Song	The <i>J</i> is not in the classical pronunciation alphabet, but is in the alphabet used with the ecclesiastical pronunciation.
page 12, Chapter 3	“Say the ending so that it rhymes with moose!”	“Say the ending so that it rhymes with fuss!”
